INVESTIGATIVE COUNSEL

Investigative Counsel conduct a broad range of investigations and reviews of Department of Justice personnel and programs. Our work includes sensitive misconduct investigations of senior-level employees, examinations of high-profile Department law enforcement operations, and reviews of the Department's use of national security authorities. Investigative Counsel lead multi-disciplinary teams that blend the skills of Attorneys, Special Agents, Program Analysts, and Paralegals. These teams produce reports and recommendations that promote individual accountability of Department employees and tangible improvement in Department operations. They are also responsible for conducting investigations of whistleblower retaliation cases involving FBI employees and the employees of Department contractors.

INVESTIGATIVE COUNSEL QUALIFICATIONS

Graduate from a law school accredited by the American Bar Association and be a member in good standing of a state, territory of the United States, District of Columbia, or Commonwealth of Puerto Rico bar and have at least 1 year of specialized experience. Specialized experience varies based on position need.

Prior experience in criminal prosecution or civil law enforcement or in investigating whistleblower retaliation cases is desired but is not essential.
