Program Analysts in the Evaluation and Inspections Division examine issues throughout the Department of Justice, including in the FBI, DEA, BOP, USMS, ATF, and USAO. The Program Analysts' work is complex, multidisciplinary, and results-oriented.

Working in teams, Program Analysts must quickly develop a clear understanding of the Department programs and activities being reviewed, and analyze the operations to identify best practices and needed improvements. They then prepare comprehensive reports that include recommendations for actions that Department managers can take to improve the program's achievement of its intended purposes, thereby providing better value to the taxpayer.

QUALIFICATIONS

- Bachelor's degree from an accredited college or university and a record of high academic achievement. Strong writing, analytical, research, and computer skills.
- Education and experience in quantitative and qualitative analysis, research methodology, statistics, policy analysis, planning and evaluation techniques, and technical report writing are valuable qualifying attributes.
