



While declined ever driving or being a passenger in the old gave greater weight to the matching statements of the two subordinates, both of which conflicted with statement. Neither nor had a motive to misrepresent the facts as they recounted them. Neither demonstrated any hostility toward in their interviews; instead both described positive relationships with and so with convincing demeanors. Alternatively, demeanor was angry and defensive when confronted with the evidence that contradicted past statements. Further, failed to answer OlG's direct questions clearly, instead dismissing and actions as having taken place outside presence. Overall, the OlG evaluates that and significantly more credible than that presented by
